Michigan Tech ends losing streak at seven games

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)

Michigan Tech ended its losing streak in the WCHA at seven games with a win over Minnesota Duluth this weekend.

Friday night's 6-5 victory was also the first league win for first-year Huskies coach Jamie Russell.

"I liked a lot of the things I saw," Russell said. "There were some areas that we obviously need to be better It was particularly nice to see our power play score four times."

The Huskies (3-8-3, 1-7-2 WCHA) scored four goals in the first period and added two more in the third to hold of Duluth (9-6-2, 7-3-0). Colin Murphy scored **Michigan Tech**'s first and last goals of the game. Brandon Schwartz, Taggart Desmet, Chris Conner and Marek Dora also found the back of the net for the Huskies.

Duluth scored three goals of its own in the second period to pull to 4-3. Evan Schwabe, T.J. Caig and Nick Anderson all converted to give the Bulldogs a chance for the win. In the end, third-period goals by Josh Miskovich and Tim Hambly of Duluth weren't enough to move past **Michigan Tech**.

On Saturday, Duluth handed **Michigan Tech** a 4-0 loss, outshooting the Huskies 30-21.

Duluth got on the board with a goal by Marco Peluso at 11:04 in the second. Evan Schwabe scored a power-play goal seven minutes later to make it 2-0. Justin Williams and Steve Czech put the game out of reach for the Huskies, each scoring in the third. **Michigan Tech** got 26 saves from Cam Ellsworth.

In other WCHA action: St. Cloud State skated past Colorado College 2-0 Friday only to fall to the Tigers 6-1 Saturday; Wisconsin extended its unbeaten streak to 12 games with a 2-2 tie with Denver Friday and a 3-1 win Saturday; and Minnesota handed Alaska-Anchorage a 4-0 loss Friday and then fell to the Seawolves 6-4 Saturday.

St. Cloud State (10-4-2, 8-2-2) used third-period goals by Joe Jensen and Brock Hooton to beat Colorado College (9-2-3, 4-2-2) Friday. Adam Coole had 27 saves for the league-leading Huskies.

On Saturday, the Tigers came back to stun the Huskies with a 6-1 win. It was St. Cloud's worst defeat since a 6-0 loss Nov. 5, 1999, at North Dakota.

Brett Sterling and Trevor Frischmon each scored twice for the Tigers, who powered past St. Cloud with four goals in the first period. Mike Doyle scored the Huskies' only goal of the game at 16:36 in the first. Matt Zaba had 25 stops for Colorado.

"It was just one of those nights, but I never expected this," Huskies coach Craig Dahl said. "It was a combination of bounces going against us but we didn't have our feet moving and it snowballed on us. We can't get down by four."

St. Cloud's only other loss this season came against top-ranked North Dakota by a 2 - 1 score Nov. 15.

Wisconsin (9-3-4, 4-2-4) and Denver (9-5-2, 3-5-2) both scored twice in a feverish third period that ended in a 2-2 tie Friday.

Robbie Earl and Nick Licari scored for the Badgers at 5:46 and 12:14 respectively in the third. But Denver came back as Greg Keith and Lukas Dora each scored for a 2-2 tie. Adam Berkhoel stopped 36 shots for the Pioneers while Bernd Bruckler had 31 saves for Wisconsin.

The Badgers scored two goals in the final period Saturday to pull past Denver 3-1.

Tom Gilbert scored a goal for Wisconsin at 8:21 of the second while Brett Skinner notched a goal for Denver five minutes later. Ryan MacMurchy and Jake Dowell sealed the game for the Badgers with third-period goals. Berkhoel had 33 saves for Denver.

Minnesota (7-8-1, 4-7-1) outshot Alaska-Anchorage 43-18 Friday night en route to a 4-0 victory. Minnesota goalie Kellen Briggs tallied his second career shutout. Keith Ballard, Troy Riddle, Barry Tallackson and Thomas Vanek each scored for the Gophers. Chris King stopped 39 shots for Alaska (5-7-2, 2-6-2).

The Seawolves scored three goals in the third period in a come-from-behind win over Minnesota Saturday.

The Gophers jumped out to a 4-3 lead heading into the third period after scoring three times in the second. Gino Guyer scored two goals within four minutes of each other in Minnesota's offensive surge. But the Seawolves mounted a comeback with goals by Spence Gilchrist, John Hopson and Charlie Kronschnabel.

UMD men shut out Tech

Minnesota Duluth winger Marco Peluso made sure to get the game puck from referee Derek Shepherd on Saturday night for goalie Josh Johnson.

Johnson earned the first shutout of his college career in his first Western Collegiate Hockey Association start as UMD beat **Michigan Tech** 4-0 before 2,995 at MacInnes Ice Arena.

Johnson, a freshman from Esko, probably wouldn't mind sharing the puck with his teammates. The Bulldogs made a significant turnaround from Friday's 6-5 loss.

"We didn't have our best game Friday, but good teams find a way to rebound," said Johnson, who had 21 saves, just one in the third period. "This was just a great defensive effort all the way around. I really didn't have that many tough saves."

On Friday, **Michigan Tech** scored four first-period goals, four power-play goals and got four goals from its explosive top line. There was none of that in the rematch. There was just one shot on goal in four power plays on the way to UMD's first shutout since a 12-

0 win at Bemidji State one year ago.

The Bulldogs (9-6-2 and 7-3 in the WCHA) continued second in the league by getting second-period goals from Peluso and Evan Schwabe, and third-period goals from defenseman Steve Czech and Justin Williams.

Michigan Tech (3-8-3 and 1-7-2) remains last in the WCHA. The Huskies had some decent scoring chances, including a handful in the second period, but couldn't dent UMD's defense.

"That was the biggest two points we've gotten this season," said Czech. "We had 22 guys who were ticked off after Friday and we knew we had to play better in the defensive zone, especially when (**Michigan Tech** was on a power play). We finished our checks and did the hardworking things you need to to win."

Johnson was making his third start of the season after playing the final two periods Friday in place of sophomore Isaac Reichmuth, who has 47 starts in two years.

While the first period was scoreless, UMD dominated much of the 20 minutes and put the Huskies on their heels. At the same time, Johnson came up with some tough stops, including one on

winger Brett Engelhardt. **Michigan Tech** winger Frank Werner had Johnson out of position for a point-blank attempt with 90 seconds left, but his shot went off the leg of Czech.

"Friday night it seemed everything we shot went in and tonight I was shaking my head saying 'How did that not go in?' A lot of that was their goaltending. He was outstanding," said **Michigan Tech** coach Jamie Russell.

Two second-period goals gave UMD its first lead of the series. Peluso finished a 2-on-2 rush as Tim Stapleton made a cross-ice pass with 8:56 left. Peluso jammed the puck inside the left post for a 1-0 advantage. That came as the teams skated 4-on-4.

A power-play goal made it 2-0 with 89 seconds to go. Schwabe had little net showing as he held the puck low on the right side yet snapped a shot that beat goalie Cam Ellsworth to the near side. It was the fifth goal of the season for UMD's top assist man.

Czech's first goal of the season put UMD up 3-0 at 4:14 of the third period. His powerplay drive from the right point beat Ellsworth cleanly. **Michigan Tech** center Taggart Desmet was off for tripping Tyler Brosz. Schwabe then fed Williams alone in front of

the **Michigan Tech** net with 5:13 to play.

"I was happy we got the two points for the win, but I was more happy with the team effort to get the shutout," said UMD coach Scott Sandelin, whose team outshot the Huskies 30-21. "We set the tempo on our first three shifts and even though it was a tight-checking game, we didn't sit back after we got the lead. That ranks with the best games we've played this season."

UMD continues on the road at No. 1-ranked North Dakota this Friday and Saturday in Grand Forks, N.D.

Tech's fast start finishes Bulldogs

WCHA MEN:UMD can't overcome an early 4-0 deficit against last-place Huskies

Michigan Tech used this formula to win its first Western Collegiate Hockey Association men's game of the season Friday night: score four first-period goals, add two third-period power-play goals and hang on.

It was enough for the lastplace Huskies to defeat second-place Minnesota Duluth 6-5 before 2,104 at MacInnes Ice Arena.

UMD (8-6-2, 6-3 WCHA) rallied after trailing 4-0 after one period, but could never pull even and saw a five-game unbeaten streak evaporate.

Michigan Tech (3-7-3, 1-6-2) handed first-year coach Jamie Russell his first league win while ending a seven-game winless streak.

Igniting the Huskies was the No. 1 line of Chris Conner, Taggart Desmet and Colin Murphy, which started the season with a flurry of points but had tailed off the past five games. By the end of the first period each linemate had a goal.

"Things weren't going our way no matter what we did, so the team started from scratch again," said Murphy, a junior right winger. "Coach brought in a system that suits us, a runand-gun system that depends on a good forecheck, and we had gotten away from that."

Murphy showed the way by scoring on **Michigan Tech**'s first shot on goal 6:52 into the first period. Three goals in 6 minutes sent the Bulldogs reeling later in the period (two power-play goals and one short-handed). Left winger Chris Conner finished **Michigan Tech**'s most productive first period in a decade by adding his Division I-leading 13th goal of the season.

UMD aided **Michigan Tech**'s effort with 15 penalties, leading to four power-play goals.

Last Saturday, Minnesota State-Mankato trailed 4-0 at the DECC and ultimately forced overtime before UMD won 5-4.

"We weren't that down in the dumps after the first period because we remembered what Mankato did to us. We knew we had it in us," said UMD junior defenseman Tim Hambly, who played despite being diagnosed with mononucleosis this week and had a goal and an assist. "We battled so hard to get back, but **Michigan Tech**'s a good team and we could just never get out of the hole."

The WCHA's highest-scoring team gave it a try. UMD coach Scott Sandelin replaced starting goalie Isaac Reichmuth after the first period with freshman Josh Johnson and the Bulldogs responded with the only three goals of the second period, and ultimately outshot **Michigan Tech** 35-22.

Center Evan Schwabe connected in a 5-on-3 power play and 74 seconds later defenseman Steve Czech sent T.J. Caig in for a breakaway powerplay goal that went through the legs of goalie Bryce Luker. Winger Nick Anderson then batted a puck out of the air at 9:21 and it hit the ice in the crease and bounced past Luker.

UMD was within 4-3 with a period to play.

"After the first period I told them that they still had 40 minutes to win a game," Sandelin said. "But then we took stupid penalty after stupid penalty in the third period. **Michigan Tech** was able to take advantage of its opportunities and stay ahead. That was just too big of a lead to recover from."

Freshman defenseman Marek Dora scored his first collegiate goal on a power play 2:54 into the third period for a 5-3 **Michigan Tech** advantage. Josh Miskovich's first goal of the season cut that to 5-4 at 5:39, then Murphy provided the game-winner with his first-power play goal in three seasons with the Huskies. That came with 6:45 to play and made **Michigan Tech** 1-0 in December after going zero-for-November.

"We have played some other good games in the league this season, games that we could've won. We tied at St. Cloud State and tied at Mankato," said Russell, a former **Michigan Tech** defenseman who was a Cornell assistant the past four years. "We have such a young team that it was nice that we showed a lot of poise tonight and were rewarded."

With 97 seconds to play, four skirmishes broke out in UMD's offensive zone and four players on each team received penalties. UMD's Anderson was given a game disqualification for leaving the bench to join the altercation and cannot play in today's 6:05 p.m. rematch. Hambly scored with 32 seconds to play after Johnson had been pulled for an extra attacker.

Grand Valley is off to a 6-1 start and Clayton has played in three games. The Lakers downed Ashland 94-84 on the road.

Wruble, who has been battling some sickness for the past week, played Thursday night for the Bulldogs. He scored six points in a 69-58 loss at Findlay.

Saginaw Valley State got 27 points from Anthony Parker and made 21 of 26 free throws in an 88-84 victory over Wayne State in a Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference opener Thursday night at the Matthaei Building.

Parker was 10-for-19 from the field and 6-for-6 from the free-throw line for the Cardinals (5-1).

Tim Fralick scored 22 points on 7-for-16 shooting, and David Williams was 7-for-11 for 15 points. Maurice Brown's 15 boards helped Saginaw Valley to a 44-34 rebounding advantage.

James Davis scored 26 points, and Kendon Edwards had 19 points and 11 rebounds for the Warriors (3-3).

Davis made all three of his free throws and set a school record for consecutive free throws in a season with 23, surpassing Terry Cuples' 22 straight in 1967-68.

EDMONTON - The Fort Saskatchewan Traders are next to last in their division, where they finished last season. The difference is that they are keeping pace with the fast crowd in the Alberta Junior Hockey League's North Division.

"It's a scramble for everyone right now," said Nolan Crouse, coach of the seventh place Traders who sit a game under .500 with a 12-13-4 record.

With three games in hand over most of the division, the Traders are just eight points behind second place St. Albert, as they begin a home-and-home series with the Saints tonight at 7:35 p.m. at the Jubilee Rec Centre.

They visit Akinsdale arena Saturday at 7 p.m.

"It's conceivable that the entire division could be over .500 at the end of the year, so there's no opportunity to take a night off," said Crouse.

Having given up the most goals and scored the second fewest in the North, the Traders have still found a way to hang in.

"We're grittier, bigger now," said Crouse, who added four new defencemen during the off-season. That gritty element, according to Crouse, was lacking last season during a tailspin when the club won just four games after November and lost 20. They finished 14 points out of the playoffs.

Goals remain at a premium with offensive talent Mitch McGillvary having been sidelined almost since the start of the season.

He's out with a deep thigh bruise.

Team captian Tyler Hawryluk has been hot of late with two goals and an assist in Wednesday's 5-4 win over Drayton Valley, but no Trader is among the league's top 20 scorers.

"Right now it's a requisite that to win, we do it by committee," said Crouse.

UMD can play more than defense

The highest scoring team in Western Collegiate Hockey Association?

If you said Minnesota Duluth. you're a true WCHA statistic freak. The Bulldogs haven't finished first in league goalscoring since 1992-93 (when they won the MacNaughton Cup and advanced to the NCAA Division I tournament.)

But through eight games this season, UMD has the WCHA's top offense with 4.88 goals a game, Top-ranked North Dakota is second at 4.83.

While defense always will be stressed by coach Scott Sandelin and his staff, having a few extra goals has been a benefit. The Bulldogs are in second place in the league after 8-5 and 5-4 home wins last weekend over Minnesota State-Mankato.

"If you're winning, scoring a lot of goals is fine," says Sandelin. "If you're losing, it doesn't matter."

UMD made a point of winning with defense last season, especially in going 11-4-1 the final 16 games. The Bulldogs allowed just 2.81 goals per game (second-best in the league) and scored 3.34 on offense.

This season the Bulldogs are fifth among 10 teams in WCHA defense -- allowing three goals a game.

"I'd like to cut our goalsagainst down by one goal," said Sandelin.

The Bulldogs (8-5-2) head into Friday and Saturday games at last-place Michigan **Tech** with the league's No. 1 power play (29.7 percent efficiency) and No. 1 scorer in senior winger Junior Lessard (12 goals, nine assists, 21 points).

UMD has a five-game unbeaten streak (4-0-1), including a unique last four games. The Bulldogs trailed at Union College by two goals each night and rallied for a tie and win, and against Mankato led by five goals Friday and four goals Saturday before holding on to win.

"The feeling (Saturday) after getting a 4-0 lead was that we had enough goals and should just play defense, and sometimes that thinking can get you in trouble," said UMD winger Justin Williams, who scored the winning goal in overtime.

Getting the lead has been a UMD strength. The Bulldogs have outscored opponents 21-11 in the first period this season, HURTING DOGS

Sandelin left defensemen Beau Geisler and Ryan Geris, and forwards Dan Kronick and Brett Hammond, at home with injuries this weekend. Defenseman Tim Hambly made the trip to Michigan Tech, but has been sick all week.

Because UMD has just five healthy defenseman, junior winger Josh Miskovich of Pengilly spent time on defense at practice this week.

TECH SCORERS COOL

First-year Michigan Tech coach Jamie Russell got to see the top-scoring line in Division I during the first month of the season. Wingers Chris Conner and Colin Murphy, and center Taggart Desmet play for the Huskies.

While those three have cooled recently, Russell believes the line is as good as any in the WCHA and hopes it gets untracked this weekend against UMD in Houghton,

Russell, 37, a former Michigan Tech defenseman who followed Mike Sertich as coach, has brought in a more aggressive style.

"This was a more passive team and now we really go after teams," says Russell, a Cornell assistant the past four years.

The Huskies (10-24-4 last season) are young. In their last series, two losses at Minnesota on Nov. 21-22, they had 13 freshmen and sophomores in the lineup.

Scoring leader Murphy (9-10-19), a junior, has one goal the past four games. Conner (12-6-18), a sophomore, has been held without a point the past five games. Desmet (4-8-12), a freshman, has one assist the past five games.

Not coincidentally, **Michigan Tech** (2-7-3) is on a sevengame winless streak at 0-5-2 and is winless in the league at 0-6-2.

HOT BADGERS

The Wisconsin Badgers (8-3-3) are the hottest team in Division I. They're on a 10-game unbeaten streak (7-0-3) following weekend road wins at Michigan 3-1 and Michigan State 2-1 in overtime.

Remember the Badgers last season? They were 10 games under .500 and placed eighth in the WCHA under first-year coach Mike Eaves (13-23-4).

"We're kind of on the other end of the spectrum from last year," sophomore defenseman Tom Sawatske of Duluth told the Wisconsin State Journal.
